









## **Application Procedure**

- ► Those interested in the field school must fill out an application and provide the following by Feb. 26:
  - General application form (to be downloaded from Dr. Bubel's web site at: http://people.uleth.ca/~bubest/)
  - Medical form (included with the application form)
  - Essay on why you wish to participate in the project
  - Transcripts
  - Letter of reference (form is included with the app. form)
  - \$200 Application Fee (to be deducted from the course fee)
- Selection Committee will meet by March 4, 2019

## Course Requirements

- Arky 1000 (and preferably a 3000-level Arky course)
- Registration
  - Only those accepted to the field school will be able to register for Arky 3000 and 3300
  - Students will fill out course forms to register for the field school
- Grade assessments for the courses are based on the quality of your field work, note books, assignments and examinations
- Hard work and team work

### Costs

- ► Tuition
  - Two summer session courses (Arky 3000 & 3300)= +/- \$1200 CAN
- Airfare
  - Calgary/Tel Aviv/Calgary = +/- \$1800 CAN
- Room and Board
  - Cost for room and board while at the kibbutz = +/- \$2400 US
- Field trips
  - 4 Course field trips = +/- \$900 US
    - ▶ Visit to the South (Dead Sea, Masada, Arad, the Negev and other sites)
    - ▶ Visit to the North (Tel Dan, Megiddo, Hazor, Caesarea, Mediterranean Sea, etc.)
    - Visit to Central Israel (Tel Aviv, Beit Guvrin)
    - ▶ Visit to Jerusalem
  - After trip to Jordan = \$500 US (optional)

- Total Estimated Costs = +/- \$6650 (plus \$1200 tuition and spending money)
